- 1. Top health concerns in the community/Experiences accessing health care services (the first question bled into the 3rd question so they are combined below)
 - O Lack of specialists
 - O Mental health not enough providers
 - O Vaping among middle school students
 - O Phone usage among adolescents
 - O Distracted driving
 - O Nursing shortages are causing burnout and diminished care by the few who are overworked
 - Follow-up why so critical?
 - The people who have the most overwhelm are in a healthcare system that adds to the overwhelm
 - Middle school is such a critical time and vaping takes kids off their path

 - Affordable and low-income housing options are limited, so people are paying more than half their income on rent, causing family stress
 - Food insecurity in the summer impacts kids disproportionately
 - Vaping among teens then leads to discipline problems and instability in the middle school
 - O Follow-up: what kind of support would make the biggest difference?
 - Give people assistance in navigating housing options hard to know where to look
 - Seems to be many food pantries/programs that do not work together, so if they collaborated they could be more efficient
 - Parent education
- 3. Experiences accessing healthcare services
 - Dental care and Eye care are very difficult to access if on Medicaid
 - Very long waitlists for mental health care
 - Poverty discrimination for providers who do accept Medicaid
 - Challenging to access services as a single parent with multiple kids don't have time, and services are only offered during working hours
 - O Follow-up did not elicit further discussion

 - Bridging Forward (poverty alleviation program that many participants are in) could benefit others
 - A non-emergency part of the ER where people could go on the weekends/evenings

- 1. Top health concerns in the community:

- 1. Top health concerns in the community/Experiences accessing health care services (the first question bled into the 3rd question so they are combined below)
 - Drug abuse (across all age groups)
 - Cancer seems to be so prevalent
 - Diabetes
 - Transportation issues for medical appointments
 - Shortage of EMTs and ambulance services
 - Lack of affordable in-home care
 - Potential closure of the county health department
 - Challenges with insurance and Medicare reimbursements, including challenges understanding insurance
 - Follow-up why so critical?

If we can't get to medical appointments easily, people don't go and then it gets worse

 - No local dentists, requiring travel to other towns
 - Two medical clinics, a pharmacy, and physical therapist available locally
 - Some mental health services available, but limited
 - Transportation to out-of-town services is a challenge
 - Local pharmacy offers delivery services, which is helpful
 - O Follow-up did not elicit further discussion
- 5. Programs or resources seen elsewhere that could benefit the community:
 - Participants know about and use: foot clinic, hearing aid services, immunizations for preschoolers, helping support a blood drive.
 - Importance of maintaining it: unanimously considered very important, provides essential services otherwise not available
 - If there was no health department, people would not get the services because of the time or cost of getting in Hastings or Superior, the lack of familiarity with the providers there
- 7. Hopes for future health and well-being of the community:
 - Keeping local businesses (grocery stores, pharmacies) open to serve aging population
 - Improved cancer care
 - More affordable and accessible in-home care and assisted living options

 - Lack of EMTs and ambulance drivers, causing long wait times for emergency transport
 - O This response was very detailed with data
 - O Scholarship program did not see much return
 - O Training and different schedule scenarios have been practiced
 - Limited dental care access, especially for children kids are not receiving care
 - Mental health services, particularly for families and elderly and students (school needs more than 2 days of LMHP care)
 - Potential closure of nursing homes, leading to lack of care for elderly population
 - Shortage of home health care services -
 - Aging pharmacist (70 years old) with no replacement lined up
 - Limited access to fresh produce
 - Kids are vaping more than we think

Summary of CHA Focus Group Meeting – 07/09/2024

1. Top Health Concerns:

- Key issues identified by the community include obesity, alcoholism, depression, diabetes, dental issues, mental health, suicide, sedentarism, and cancer.
- Reasons for concern: Emphasis on early prevention starting in childhood, free access to healthcare, housing, food, and education. Concerns about junk food advertisements and a lack of healthy lifestyle promotion.
- Access issues: Lack of affordable healthcare, challenges in qualifying for assistance programs, and difficulty accessing vaccines locally. Some residents are fearful of healthcare due to perceived risks, like Guillain-Barre syndrome.

2. Family Support Resources and Social Determinants of Health (SDOH):

 Housing and employment are significant health determinants; difficulties include expensive and poor-quality housing conditions (e.g., infestations).

- Needed support: Access to decent jobs and less bureaucratic support programs that are inclusive of immigrants, regardless of their work permit status.
- Encouragement for community solidarity, trust, and non-judgmental attitudes in assisting those in need.

3. Access to Care:

- Challenges in accessing medical, dental, optical, and mental health services. Lack of low-resource clinics for children and teenagers.
- Language barriers due to insufficient Spanish-speaking staff and lack of culturally competent care providers.
- Long wait times for appointments and the high cost of convenient care deter people from seeking necessary medical attention.
